THE RITZ

One of the most iconic hotels in the world, The Ritz is as extravagant and Instagram-worthy as you'd imagine it to be. Bouquets of fragrant roses welcome you to its chandelier-lit gallery and a hand-painted, period lift takes you to your room dressed in powdery hues, elegant florals, gold leaf mouldings and Chesterfield headboards. A member of the Leading Hotels of the World, the Ritz has stayed true to its heritage since it opened its doors in 1906. Most importantly, it is located in the heart of central London, surrounded by fascinating cultural institutions, fashionable Soho district, and famous shopping zones. Make sure to ask for a room on the highest available floor to enjoy incredible city views.

THE LANDMARK LONDON


One of the city's best-kept secrets, The Landmark London spells "serenity with luxury". Think public areas with oversized chandeliers, antique furniture, ornate plasterwork and frescoes, blending beautifully with the building's 19th century heritage. One of the largest in the city, its rooms are all about plush drapes in creamy blue and beige with Italian marble bathrooms. Meals at the tropical Winter Garden - a huge glass-roofed Victorian atrium with soaring palm trees and exotic massages and body exfoliation treatments at the spa are the highlights of your stay here. Sitting right next to Marylebone station, it is conveniently located from attractions such as Madam Tussauds and London Zoo.



THE LANESBOROUGH



Alain Ducasse at The Dorchester

Superstar Alain Ducasse and three Michelin stars—you're sure to be treated to one of the best meals of your life, both in taste and presentation. To celebrate a special occasion over the best in French contemporary haute-cuisine, book a table in a calming, classic cream-coloured dining room. Try homemade pasta, Dorset crab, celeriac and caviar, halibut with oyster and seaweed, dry-aged beef with artichoke and marrow, lobster with truffled chicken quenelles, saddle of venison, parsnip and peanut among other signature dishes and pair these with world-class French wines.

Céleste at The Lanesborough

Modern European cuisine in a richly decorated, Venetian-style dining room. Chef Patron, Éric Fréchon, who oversees the menu from their sister hotel Le Bristol in Paris, holds a total of five Michelin stars. On the menu: white asparagus with truffle mayonnaise, Scottish langoustine ravioli, halibut in green zebra tomato tartare and lemon thyme.




The Goring Dining Room

Indulge in sophisticated interpretations of British classics at one of the most exquisite dining rooms that's bathed in natural light by day and aglow with shimmering Swarovski chandeliers at night. The 103-year-old Goring Dining Room at the family-owned Goring hotel easily appears on the list of top restaurants for a fine-dining meal in London. Let bow-tied waiters serve you with a selection of truffles and wild herbs to perfectly complement each dish. Also, the restaurant remains one of last and very few to serve roast rib of beef that's carved from a silver trolley, in a very traditional manner.

St James's

With Trafalgar Square, Piccadilly Circus, Green Park, and Buckingham Palace defining its four corners, St James's is a luxury shopper's paradise in the beating heart of London. Alfies Antique Market

A short walk from The Landmark London, Marylebone, Alfies Antique Market is not your regular market with antique knick knacks. It is a bustling five-storey market with more than 100 antique dealers selling carefully-curated vintage fashion and accessories, modernist furniture, tasteful home decor, costume jewellery, and 20th century decorative arts. Expect an ostentatious display of Ancient Greek, Roman, and Byzantine coins, Islamic arts, designer glass and ceramics, pricey porcelain and English china, Italian lighting and home accessories that will make you want to splurge. Housed in an Egyptian-style art deco façade, the swanky indoor market has attracted serious collectors, interior designers, and celebrities for over 40 years. Wish to take a break from shopping? Enjoy a coffee or a glass of prosecco at their roof-top eatery.
